vacant because Cynthia Widdows chose not to run for reelection, and Stewart Peller recently resigned because of schedule conflicts between Board meetings and meetings related to his expanding business. Stu, who served many years on the Board, and Cynthia, who joined the Board in 2005, were applauded at the Annual Meeting. They both are especially appreciated for all the hours they spent at many extra meetings during the construction and renovation project.

Other Board members include Treasurer and Acting Secretary John Rastl; Past-President Bruce Hopkins; Margie Thomsen and Len Ney. Len joined the Board in 2008. 

Brad and Tanner Herget - #228

Brad Herget started his first business when he was in high school in North Conway, New Hampshire. "It was a DJ business," said Brad. "I started it and got it rolling and then I sold it to Tanner for \$1,200. He made it four times more profitable than I did." His 27 year-old brother, Tanner, is the owner of 51 Wharf, a Portland restaurant and night club with great food and entertainment. Tanner said they have closed the restaurant for the fall and winter, but the night club remains open. Next spring and summer they'll go back to serving lunch and dinner with expanded hours. Tanner said he originally started 51 Wharf as a tapas and high-end martini place where people could stop in for drinks and appetizers or dessert. "The place gradually changed with late night entertainment," he said. In the summer of 2007 Brad, who had been working at the Ritz Carlton Hotel in Hawaii, joined him and they put a lot of money into lights and the sound system. Tanner said, "We have done two major renovations and one expansion. We do most of the work ourselves." Brad, 30, said his brother thinks of things from the business side. "I have ideas," he said, "and Tanner makes it work financially."

Tanner said he learned about business from his father who owns a company that supplies lumber to contractors. "My dad always said cash flow is what matters." Besides working part of the time in the restaurant, Tanner teaches Introduction to Business at the University of New Hampshire. He splits his time between Portland and Dover where he owns a house and spends time with his son, Tavin, who was born in July.

Brad, who says he always worked in restaurants while in high school and college, majored in aeronautical science at Embry-Riddle in Florida and is a licensed pilot. He lived in Florida, then Hawaii before moving to Portland and now manages 51 Wharf.

Tanner and Brad enjoy travel when they can find the time and said their family traveled quite a bit while they were growing up. "Our parents have been married 40 years," said Tanner. "They took us to 49 states and a couple of times to Europe."

Both brothers enjoy living in Portland. Tanner compares Portland to San Francisco with all the incredible restaurants. "There's always a place to go," he said. "Florida and Hawaii are great," said Brad, "but here we have the seasons."

Tanner says he likes living at Promenade Towers away from the party atmosphere at work and adds, "I like the security here. I love the water views and the deck." He agrees with Brad who says, "This is one of the best spots in Portland. The community we have here is amazing."
