Bruce and Marion Hopkins - #145/146

Bruce and Marion Hopkins love Maine. "We came here almost every summer during our married life before we moved here," said Bruce. "I like the ocean, the mountains and the lakes." Marion, a native of Portland, agrees.

Bruce and Marion met on a blind date while she was a student at Simmons College in Boston and he at MIT. After graduating from MIT, Bruce designed surgical equipment for five years and then went to business school at Dartmouth. His career took them to New York, New Hampshire, Ohio, Virginia and Connecticut. He and Marion moved to Maine in 1990 when he bought a printing company in Yarmouth.

While their two sons were young, Marion volunteered her time with Cub Scouts, PTA and their church. It wasn't until their boys were older that she worked part-time and taught piano lessons. "I wanted to be a stay-at-home mom," she said. Marion's life changed considerably in 2006 when she suffered a stroke. Describing her recovery, she says that mental, emotional and physical exercise will be a lifetime endeavor. "I am learning to accept and be comfortable with the new me."

In 1998 Bruce decided to sell his business when he was diagnosed with chronic lymphocytic leukemia, a type of leukemia that is progressive and untreatable. His status has declined steadily but, he says, "So far I am very lucky to be one of those who decline very slowly." Bruce's experience with leukemia led him to a new career working with cancer patients as a massage therapist. He

went to massage school for a year and then went to Arizona for additional training in oncology massage. "I feel more useful doing this than anything I've ever done," said Bruce. In 2007 he founded the Society for Oncology Massage and is webmaster for this organization which has members throughout the United States, as well as Canada, Brazil, Australia and Scotland.

Bruce is also the webmaster for Promenade Towers. He is a past president of our Association and has been on the Board of Directors since 1996. He says, "I like the people and the organization and the way we've been able to turn the building around." He and Marion both enjoy living here. Marion says, "I like my neighbors. I like the view and being close to the ocean. It's a great location. I can get to almost anywhere I need to go in ten to fifteen minutes."

Marion and Bruce have traveled throughout the U.S. They've taken a train across Canada, cruised on the Danube and the Caribbean and vacationed in Europe and Israel. Marion visited one of their sons and his family in Hong Kong and traveled with them to Thailand. She laughed and said, "I rode an elephant there."

Closer to home they spend holidays and summers with family and friends at their camp in Damariscotta. The front porch of their cabin is just sixty feet from Biscay Pond. Looking back on their life and travels, Bruce says, "It's been a grand adventure!"
