Louise Little and Will Gorham Collecting Redeemables

When Will Gorham moved to our building in 2009, he suggested that our Association get involved in the Munjoy Hill Neighborhood Organization's fuel assistance program. MHNO works with Breggy Oil, a company that identifies people who need help with their heating bills.

Promenade Towers residents know they're helping the environment when they bring their redeemable bottles and cans down to the trash closet by the service entrance. They may not know that they're also helping low-income families in our neighborhood with their heating bills. Louise Little, a volunteer from MHNO, and Will Gorham collect our redeemables and put them in the green CLYNK bags. Will said, "We collect about fifteen to twenty bags every two weeks. We load them in my truck and take them to Hannaford's where we average \$5.00 to \$6.00 per bag."

The bags can only contain **redeemable** bottles and cans. CLYNK is not a program that collects and recycles cardboard, paper, food cans and glass containers that are not redeemable. Will and Louise sort through our donations and discard items that they sometimes find mixed in with the redeemables.

Will says that he and Louise are grateful to Promenade Towers residents who are reaching out and helping those in need on Munjoy Hill. He said, "Since we started here, we've raised between \$4,000 and \$5,000 for the program."


The Final Know Your Neighbors Contest
